The Discover Pass

Field trip attendees and all other Washington recreationists need to inform themselves about the new **Discover Pass**, issued by the state for parking on State Lands including State Parks, Washington Dept. of Fish & Wildlife lands like the Skagit Wildlife Area and the West 90, as well as Dept. of Natural Resources lands. Find info. at http://discoverpass.wa.gov/

The passes are issued specifically to a single car and can be purchased for a single day (\$10) or as an annual pass (\$30 -\$35) good for 365 days from day of issue

About the field trips

Please be prepared for the weather with suitable clothing, and bring field guides, binoculars, and spotting scopes. Carpool whenever possible and contribute to the driver's expense. Lex Alfred Hedley -Birds, Art, and Writing

Lex Hedley is completing a manuscript for a book relating his experiences as an artist following the annual migration of birds on the Pacific northwest coast. In this program he presents a brief reading from this manuscript and some slide and video examples of his work.

Lex writes, "Birds are an important part of my life, offering me a contemplative, restorative and easily accessible link to the natural world. For me, they create interludes in the rush of life, opportunities to think about the spaces in which they live and to cultivate an awareness of other, wider symmetries of nature, the fall of light on the sea, the sweep of the sky, the stillness of an estuary. In such moments, I feel at the heart of something and I am drawn to reflect upon the profound emotional and spiritual attachment we have to these creatures and spaces that so define and enrich our lives."

Lex has painted North American birds since 1989. He says that he came here from New Zealand to experience the northern landscape and to paint its bird life. His wife Sandra came to complete her post-graduate education, and their daughter Rachel, at five years of age, came because she simply didn't have any choice in the matter.

PRESIDENT'S FEBRUARY MESSAGE:

Sometimes I've wished we lived on bigger property near forest or water, but central Mount Vernon has its advantages. For one, there's the rare privilege of hearing Trumpeter Swans traveling on winter days at dusk and dawn between sleeping and feeding places. Even ardent non-birders stop and watch these gleaming giants pass overhead, close enough to hear wing beats. Our towns can seem like islands isolated from the wild world, but birds remind us how permeated with wildness the places we live really are - permeated and connected to vast wilderness, as the places where Trumpeters summer in Alaska and Canada and where Tundra Swans and this winter's Snowy Owls return even further north.

Trumpeter Swans passing the house were the first birds I noted in 2012, calling to each other as they flew over on January 1st even before I was up. Their presence is always an antidote to the disheartening things we read in the media, where slander, exaggeration, and worse substitute for reasoned debate and too often elevate the trivial or tragic above all else. Renewing and maintaining contact with the natural world offer escape or, better, a rebalanced perspective.

Birds are not immune to the effects of politically-charged subjects like land use and energy policy. In the morning the Trumpeters are bound for farm fields where they'll glean spilled corn and frozen potatoes. Those fields and the bays provide habitat abundant enough for Skagit County to host more wintering Trumpeters than anywhere else. Farms and bays are also the key to the presence of those flashing clouds of Dunlin that Peregrines and Merlins pursue. At January's Audubon meeting, Ruth Milner described how Dunlin and other shorebirds use Port Susan and Skagit Bay mudflats at low tide, but depend on the bayside fields for high tide feeding and resting. However Skagit County may have looked long ago, it now presents birds and people with a great diversity of habitats, some good for them and us, some not. As people interested in the wider world of living things, it's appropriate for us to be especially attentive to preserving and enhancing what makes this a good place for both people and wild creatures.

As I write this, a legislative committee in Olympia is considering a bill to eliminate the Growth Management Hearings Board and significantly reduce the effectiveness of the Growth Management Act. Without its protections, the habitats on which Swans, Dunlin, and many other species depend would be severely at risk, and that's just one of many bills being introduced attacking the Act. Also in the news lately is the proposed Keystone XL pipeline, unfortunately not entirely dead yet despite the many environmental threats the pipeline and tar sands oil extraction pose. Mining tar sands in Alberta directly reduces the boreal forest which supports an estimated 60% of Canada's landbirds, almost 30% of all landbirds in the U.S. and Canada combined, and millions of waterfowl, and that is only part of the problem. The price of the avian wonders we enjoy in Skagit County is our constant vigilance and readiness to protect them.

Saturday, February 18 Johnson DeBay Swan Reserve and other sites near Clear Lake & Burlington 3:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Washington Dept. of Fish & Wildlife's Johnson DeBay Swan Reserve is the only refuge in the U.S. specifically set aside for swans. In winter, our home area hosts Tundra Swans and the largest concentration of Trumpeter Swans in the world. To see hundreds of this largest of North America's waterfowl in one place is a remarkable opportunity. On this field trip we'll visit the reserve and some other sites near Clear Lake and Burlington, particularly looking for waterfowl and raptors. We'll be at the swan reserve before dusk in hopes of seeing the great white birds flying in for the night. Dress for the weather, including possible wind. Bring binoculars and, if you have one, a spotting scope. Drivers need a Washington State Discover Pass (discoverpass.wa.gov/) or other applicable pass required for parking at the reserve. Meet at the parking lot in front of PETCO in Mount Vernon just off College Way near I-5. We'll form carpools there. Saturday, February 25 Sandy Point, Lake Terrell, Birch Bay State Park, Semiahmoo and Blaine 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

If Snowy Owls are still around, we will begin at Sandy Point, then stop at Lake Terrell, Birch Bay State Park, Semiahmoo, and finish at Blaine. Our focus will be on water birds, targeting all three scoters, three loon species, grebes, and Long-tailed Ducks, plus shorebirds, e.g., Sanderlings, Black Turnstones, and Dunlin. Bring binoculars, scopes, lunch, and wind and rain gear.

If coming from south of Bellingham, meet at 8:30 a.m. to arrange carpools at the Chuckanut Park-and-Ride lot. We'll join the leaders, Joan Bird and Andrea Warner, at 9:15 a.m. at the Arco Gas Station on Slater Road. Take I-5 Exit 260, turn right from the off ramp and you'll see the Arco station on your right. NOTE - Cars cannot be left at the Arco Station. Drivers will need a Discover Pass for parking at Lake Terrell and Birch Bay State Park. Leaders:

SKAGIT AUDUBON HIKING FEBRUARY By Joan Melcher

Winter hiking continues in February with five hikes. Unexpected circumstances such as weather, logging, wash-outs, construction, or road conditions may cause cancellations or changes in the following hikes. A hike will be canceled if there are high wind warnings, flooding conditions, or snowy or icy road conditions. If you have questions or want information on any of the hikes, call JOAN MELCHER, 360-424-0407, or e-mail jdmelcher@comcast.net. All the hikes are on a Wednesday. Dogs are discouraged on Audubonsponsored hikes. If dogs are on a hike, they must be on a leash at all times.

FEBRUARY 1 LUMMI ISLAND

Walk a 7 mile loop on the north end of Lummi Island. Enjoy island, sea, and mountain views. Required is \$7 for foot-passenger ferry fare. Mostly the walking is level. Walking shoes are recommended. Meet at 8:30 a.m. at. the Chuckanut Drive park-n-ride, exit 231 from I-5 on the east side of I-5. There is no specified return time, although most will take the 1 p.m. ferry back.

FEBRUARY 8 DISCOVER OLD AND NEW ANACORTES

Wendy Gray and Mac Madenwald will lead us on a walking tour of the features of old and new Anacortes. Meet at 9 a.m. in the parking lot to the west of Anthony's. Anthony's is located along the waterfront to the east of Safeway. The walk is eight or more miles.

FEBRUARY 15 CAMANO ISLAND

Friends of Camano Island Parks (FOCIP) will lead us on hikes on Camano Island. The hike is up to 11.9 miles with shorter options available. Lunch is provided. \$2 is the suggested donation. Meet at **8:00 a.m.** in the southeast corner of the Mount Vernon Safeway parking lot or at **8:30 a.m.** at the Blue Camano Center Building on East Camano Drive. There will be a brief orientation there. Restrooms will be available. We will first hike the Camano Ridge trails then move to the Ivy

Drylake Road cul-de-sac, where hikes from there can include Cama Beach trails with a new trail available and Camano Island State Park trails. A shuttle will be available. Those wanting to do Cranberry Lake and the rest of the Cross Island trail back to Ivy can do it after lunch or just leave it out. A **Discover Pass** is required if you park in either Cama State Park or Camano Island State Park.

FEBRUARY 22 CONWAY-AREA DIKE WALK

The dike on the east side of the Skagit River north of Conway is now open to public use. Hike 3.5 miles one-way and then back. Meet at 9 a.m. in the parking area described below. You may leave when you return to your vehicle. Try lunch at the Conway Pub & Eatery? If the weather is clear there will be great views. Birds should be plentiful. From I-5 take exit 221, which is signposted Conway and Lake McMurray. This is also the Pioneer Hwy (SR 534) which leads to Stanwood. Turn west toward Conway/Stanwood and very shortly (100 yards) turn right on Fir Island Rd into Conway. Go over the rail road tracks and in 100 yards turn right on Dike Rd. just before the bridge. Do not go over the South Fork of the Skagit River Bridge onto Fir Island! Parking is available on the left in 200 yards north of the unsigned dike district building.

FEBRUARY 29, SUGAR CUBE AND WHISTLE LAKE

Terry Slotemaker (360-293-6514) or his designee will lead us on a hike in the Anacortes Forest Lands. There are 6.8 miles with a 1,600 ft. elevation gain. Also available, is a 3.41 mile self-guided option just around Whistle Lake. Meet at 9 a.m. in the Heart Lake parking lot off the Heart Lake Road south of Anacortes. You may leave when you return to the trailhead

MARCH 7 LILY LAKE LOOP Hike the Lily Lake Trail to Lily Lake and North Butte on Blanchard Mountain. Return to trail head via Max's Shortcut and the Larry Reed Trail. 8.5 mile loop, 1600 ft. total el. gain. We will divide into a faster and slower group; car pool accordingly. Meet at 8:30 a.m. at. the Chuckanut Drive park-n-ride, exit 231 from I-5 on the east side of I-5. 2:00 pm return to trailhead for the faster group; 3:00 pm for the slower group. Discover Pass required to park at the trailhead.
